

Kick off the new year with a new paint color in your living spaces, bedrooms, or basement. This month is a great time to start taking care of all the home improvement projects you've been putting off since 2022!

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Protect houseplants on window sills from the cold by placing cardboard between the plant and the glass
- Inspect your houseplants for aphids

(You can remove aphids with equal parts rubbing alcohol and water mixed with a drop of soap)

- Start germinating seeds for your garden:
 - Oregano, Rosemary, Thyme, Micro-greens, Parsley
 - Bell Peppers, Celery, Onions, Leek

(plants highlighted in blue indicate that they attract pollinators)

OUTSIDE:

- Gently shake off snow-weighted branches
- Prune bushes & trees damaged from the snow
- Leave fresh water out for the winter birds

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

Over the winter, Tom's bees need to stay active and warm to survive the cold Boston climate. Remarkably, the worker bees will form a cluster around the Queen and shiver the wing muscles to control the internal temperature of the hive, keeping it at a nice and toasty average of 81°F.

The right siding can lower your heating bill, improve your home's curb appeal, and protect your home for years! How's your siding looking? Now is the perfect time to replace or repair your siding after a long, harsh winter.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Check your tools and prepare your shed for the year ahead
- Prune houseplants regularly to encourage new growth
- Rotate your houseplants to give them even sun exposure
- Start germinating seeds for your garden:
 - Basil, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme
 - Tomatoes, Bell Peppers, Cabbage, Celery, Eggplant (plants highlighted in blue indicate that they attract pollinators)

OUTSIDE:

- Avoid walking on your lawn during a winter thaw to protect it
- Start sowing annuals for early-blooming flowers
- Replace the mulch around plant crowns that have been exposed by frost heaves

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

While the weather is still cold, Tom's bees remain clustered around the Queen, and there won't be much external activity. On warmer winter days, if the temperature reaches the 50s, the bees will leave the hive for short cleansing flights and undertaker bees will be responsible for removing dead bees from the hive.

March TCC TIPS

Spring is here, and with warmer weather approaching, it's a good time to look at your outdoor living area. Your home can benefit from adding a deck or patio. Just imagine having a beautiful, newly finished deck by June!

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Prepare your seedlings for transplant by hardening them off (water less frequently the week before planting)
- Start germinating seeds indoors:
 - Pumpkin, Watermelon

OUTSIDE:


- Remove leaves and debris from your lawn regularly & remove any burlap used to protect young shrubs over the winter
- Use plastic milk jugs to protect early-blooming flowers
- Place dark/ clear plastic over your garden to warm up the soil
- Plant any bare-root trees, shrubs, or roses now
- Plant seeds outdoors:
 - Onions, Carrots, Turnips

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

As the days become longer and the weather begins to warm, the Queen will start to lay more eggs. But with a minimal adult population after winter, there is a growing population to care for, and limited resources available. Pollen is scarce during this month, so any foraging trips made on warmer days may not be fruitful, which means that Tom's bees are at risk of starvation.

April showers can mean trouble for your gutters if they aren't functioning properly! Clean your gutters and downspouts regularly to avoid blockages and other issues.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Set up nesting boxes for chickadees, wrens, and bluebirds
- Add a rain gauge to your garden to monitor rainfall

OUTSIDE:

- Patch any dead spots in your lawn before the summer heat
- Remember to water your plants more frequently now that summer's approaching
- Remove any mulch on top of early perennials that poke through
- Start seeds outdoors:
 - Onions, Winter Squash, Okra, Potatoes, Turnips
- Plant seedlings/ transplants outdoors:
 - Basil, Cilantro, Dill, Oregano, Rosemary, Sage, Thyme
 - Pumpkin, Tomatoes, Watermelon, Bell Peppers, Eggplant (plants highlighted in blue indicate that they attract pollinators)

The colony's population continues to increase rapidly, now rearing drones in great numbers. However, this month is critical to determine the fate of Tom's hive. Despite the increased availability of food, if the weather remains too cold or inclement for Tom's bees to take foraging trips, they'll be at risk of starvation!

During these rainy months, the wood features around your home are vulnerable to wood rot and water damage! Schedule a carpentry inspection to prevent damage from worsening.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Get your hummingbird feeders ready
- Start seeds indoors:
 - Tomatoes, Bell Peppers, Celery, Eggplant (F)

OUTSIDE:

- Avoid spraying insecticides that will harm pollinators
- Prune spring-flowering shrubs as soon as the flowers fade
- Mulch around newly planted flowers, vegetables, etc
- Weed your garden
- Start seeds outdoors:
 - Dill, Winter Squash, Okra
- Plant seedlings / transplants outdoors:
 - Pumpkin, Tomatoes, Watermelon, Eggplant (S)
 - Rosemary

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

Now that the weather is consistently warmer, Tom's bees are busy foraging for pollen and nectar while the Queen focuses on laying thousands of eggs each day, rapidly increasing the population in the hive. This time of year indicates the beginning of 'swarm season'- when large groups of bees leave an established colony to form a new one in response to overcrowding in the hive.

28	29 Memorial Day	30	31	Queen bees live for 2 years, sometimes up to 3 or 4, while drones only live for 55 days. Worker bees raised in spring live for around 6-7 weeks, but worker bees raised in fall may live for 4-6 months!			

School is almost out, but is your home ready for the summer? Wooden decks get abused by harsh New England winters. Get your deck ready to impress this summer by having it refinished and stained!

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Repot houseplants to promote growth in the spring & summer
- Start planning what fall vegetables you want in your garden
- Start seeds indoors:
 - Courgette, Beans, Lettuce

OUTSIDE:

- This month focus on regular, consistent maintenance of your plants: water, weed, and feed (and do it often!)
- It's better to water your garden thoroughly once a week to establish a deep root system
- Suppress weeds in your lawn by mowing it regularly
- Plant seedlings / transplants outdoors:

-Beets, Carrots, Potatoes, Pumpkin, Squash, Zucchini

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

Hive populations peak during June and July. Depending on the size of the hive, any given colony could have around 40,000 to 60,000 bees! Right now, most of the population are worker bees, which allows them to harvest more pollen and nectar for the hive.

Now that you are spending more time outside in the sun, have you noticed the state of your home's exterior? It may finally be time to redo the exterior paint, install better energy-efficient windows, or update your front door/entrance.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Watch out for houseplants sitting directly in the window (window panes intensify heat!)
- Start seeds indoors:
 - Broccoli, Cabbage

OUTSIDE:

- Harvest as often as needed- which could be daily
- Slugs? Put out shallow dishes of beer to capture them
- Dead-head bedding plants to encourage more flowers
- Start seeds outdoors:
 - -Beets, Carrots, Cucumber, Winter Squash, Watermelon
- Plant seedlings / transplants outdoors:
 - -Tomatoes, Bell Peppers, Celery, Eggplant, Okra

With the longest day of the year behind us, the days are beginning to shorten, and the weather will start to cool. While Tom's hive population is high, the bees will be busy bringing in pollen and nectar while it's abundant. You'll continue to notice some swarming, but it should calm down around mid-July.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Order spring-blooming bulbs at the end of the month for fall planting
- Harvesting too many herbs? You can dry herbs to save them

OUTSIDE:

- Harvest your herbs just before their flowers open
- Vegetable gardens will likely require daily harvesting
- Remove old plants that have stopped producing to eliminate insects and diseases from your garden
- Start seeds outdoors:
 - Potatoes, Beans, Spinach
- Plant seedlings / transplants outdoors:
 - Broccoli, Cabbage, Kale, Lettuce, Spinach

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

As the days grow shorter, the Queen will not be laying at the same rate as June and July. The colony population will begin to diminish faster than it can grow, leading to a decrease in pollen flow, which cues the bees to start rearing 'winter bees'. Winter bees is a term given to the bees born near the end of August and onwards due to having a longer lifespan than their sisters born in the summer.

Before your home endures another harsh New England winter, get a carpentry inspection to ensure your home is ready for anything- stop small problems from becoming big problems!

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Early to mid-September is a good time to preserve your harvest
- Start saving seeds from open-pollinated and heirloom plants

OUTSIDE:

- Begin cutting back on watering to prepare your plants for dormancy
- When emptying annual beds- clean out all of the dead plants. A clean garden will have fewer diseases next spring
- Add manure, compost, and leaves to provide your garden with more organic matter
- Use netting to cover water features to prevent water-logging
- Start seeds outdoors:
 - Turnips, Carrots



WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

As we move into fall, Tom's bees will begin preparing for winter. The cold weather means the end of bloom season for flowers and trees, which means that the bee's nectar and pollen sources are diminishing. The Queen's rate of egg laying slows, and the brood area will continue to contract as the focus shifts to getting ready for the winter.

INSIDE:

- Begin preparing your shed and tools for storage: make sure the tools are thoroughly cleaned once you're finished with them, and seal your shed to deter mice
- Put away pots and containers for the season
- Now is a good time for a soil test (you can do it yourself or send it off to a lab)


OUTSIDE:

- Plant your spring bulbs and cool-season annuals
- Remove any green tomatoes still left on your plants
- Collect your fallen leaves to make leaf mould that will be ready for October 2024's soil conditioning
- Regularly pick up the leaves from your lawn to keep it healthy
- · Harvest your cool-season crops

WHAT'S THE BUZZ WITH TOM'S BEES?

With winter approaching, the Queen is laying little to no eggs in October. The drone populations in the hive have dwindled, and any remaining drones will get kicked out since the Queen will not be mating over the winter. On warm days, Tom's bees can forage for food and may rob any unprotected hives since pollen and nectar are becoming harder to find.

Bees collect pollen close to home but far enough away that predators can't find the hive. Studying these "buffer zones" helped to create an algorithm for locating killers.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

Winterize your lawn mover by wiping off all the dirt and debris

OUTSIDE:

- Till the soil of your vegetable garden to help reduce pests
- Give the compost pile a good turning before winter sets in
- Protect young evergreens from the cold with burlap
- Give your trees and shrubs one last watering before the ground freezes
- Bring in garden hoses and drain your outdoor faucets
- Check the condition of your fences, raised beds, etc.
- Mow your lawn one last time & drain any water features

On the occasional warm day, the bees will leave for cleansing flights, but otherwise, their only other job during this time is to consume honey stores to fuel the high caloric requirements needed to heat the hive.

GARDENING TASKS

INSIDE:

- Group houseplants together to help them cope with the low humidity in most homes over the winter
- Move houseplants away from windows to prevent chilling

OUTSIDE:

- Protect tender palms and tree ferns with horticultural fleece
- Cover your compost pile to prevent nutrients from leaching
- Minimize traffic on frozen ground to reduce damage to your lawn
- Start pruning dead or dangerous limbs from trees
- Use sand on icy walks in place of salt to avoid lawn damage
